
1. (20pts) Compute the following limits. Be sure to show your work. Note: Answers can be values, $+\infty$, $-\infty$, or DNE (does not exist)

(a)
$$\lim_{x \to 0} \frac{1+x^2}{\cos x}$$

Since $\lim_{X \to 0} \cos (x = 1)$
 $\lim_{X \to 0} \frac{1+x^2}{\cos x} = \frac{\pi}{2} \frac{1}{1} = 1$
(b) $\lim_{x \to 2} \frac{x^2 + x - 6}{x - 2}$
 $\lim_{X \to 2} \frac{x^2 + x - 6}{x - 2} = \lim_{X \to 2} \frac{(x - 2)(x + 3)}{x - 2} = \lim_{X \to 2} x + 3 = 5$
(c) $\lim_{x \to +\infty} \frac{5x^2 - 5}{3x^2 + x} = \lim_{X \to \infty} \frac{x^2 (5 - 5/x^2)}{x^2 (3 + x/x^2)} = \lim_{X \to \infty} \frac{5 - 5/x^2}{3 + 1/x} = \frac{5}{3}$

$$(d) \lim_{x \to 1} \frac{1}{x^2 - 1} \qquad \lim_{X \to 1^+} \frac{1}{x^2 - 1} = +\infty \qquad \implies \lim_{X \to 1^-} \frac{1}{x^2 - 1} = -\infty \qquad \implies \lim_{X \to 1^-} \frac{1}{x^2 - 1} = -\infty \qquad \implies \lim_{X \to 1^-} \frac{1}{x^2 - 1} = -\infty$$

(e)
$$\lim_{x\to 0} \frac{x^3-1}{x^2}$$
 when x is rear 0, x^2 is positive and rear zero,
where x^3-1 is rear -1 . So denominator goes to zero
and quotient is regative, so
 $\lim_{x\to 0} \frac{x^3-1}{x^2} = -\infty$ $DNE = 2$



3. (10pts) Compute the derivative of $f(x) = \frac{1}{x}$ by using the definition of the derivative; that is, compute the limit

$$f'(x) = \lim_{h \to 0} \frac{f(x+h) - f(x)}{h}$$

$$f'(x) = \lim_{h \to 0} \frac{1}{x+h} - \frac{1}{x} = \lim_{h \to 0} \frac{x - (x+h)}{h}$$

$$= \lim_{h \to 0} \frac{-h}{h \times (x+h)}$$

$$= \lim_{h \to 0} \frac{-h}{h \times (x+h)}$$

$$= \lim_{h \to 0} \frac{-1}{x (x+h)}$$

4. (10pts) Find the equation of the tangent line to the curve determined by the equation

$$x^2y + xy^3 - y = 8$$

at the point (1, 2).


Differentiate w.r.t Lohnsides

$$2xy + x^{2} \frac{dy}{dx} + y^{3} + 3xy^{2} \frac{dy}{dx} - \frac{dy}{dx} = 0$$
Plug in X=1, y=2

$$4 + \frac{dy}{dx} + 8 + 12 \frac{dy}{dx} - \frac{dy}{dx} = 0 \implies \frac{dy}{dx} = -1.$$
Live with stope -1 passing Through (1/2)

$$y - 2 = -1(x - 1)$$

$$y = -x + 3$$



5. (10pts) Use the graph of the function y = f(x) provided below to fill in the blanks.

6. (10pts) An object moves along the x-axis in such a way that its position at time at time t is given by

$$s(t) = -t^3 + 6t^2 - 9t + 1.$$

Assume that the units of the axis are measured in meters and t is measured in seconds.

(a) Find the velocity (in meters per second) of the object at time t.

 $V(t) = S'(t) = -3t^2 + 12t - 9$

(b) On what time interval is the object moving to the right? Fill in the blanks:
$$- < t < 3$$

(c) When is the acceleration of the object negative? Fill in the blank: t > 2V'(t) = att) = -6t + 122 when t > 2

7. (10pts) A snowball is being rolled to create the base of a snowman. Suppose the volume of the snowball is increasing at a rate of 10π cm³/s. How fast is the radius of the snowball increasing when the snowball is 40 cm in diameter? **Hint:** Assume the snowball remains perfectly spherical. Recall that the volume of a sphere is $V = \frac{4}{3}\pi r^3$.

$$V = \frac{4}{3} \pi r^{3}$$

$$dV_{dt} = 4\pi r^{2} dr_{dt}$$

$$40 \text{ cm} \text{ diameter} \Rightarrow r = 20$$

$$dV = 10\pi$$

$$10\pi = 4\pi (20)^{2} \frac{dr}{dt} \Rightarrow \frac{dr}{dt} = \frac{10\pi}{1000\pi} = \frac{1}{100} \text{ cm/s}$$

- 8. (10pts) Consider the function $f(x) = \sqrt[3]{x}$
 - (a) Find the linear approximation to the function $f(x) = \sqrt[3]{x}$ at x = 64. Recall: The linear approximation is the same as the equation for the tangent line.

$$f'(x) = \frac{1}{3}x^{2/3} \implies f'(64) = \frac{1}{3}(64)^{-2/3} = \frac{1}{3} \cdot \frac{1}{16} = \frac{1}{48}$$

when x is hear 64,

$$f(x) \approx 4 + \frac{1}{48}(x - 64)$$

(b) Use your answer above to estimate the value of $\sqrt[3]{65}$.

$$3\sqrt{45} = f(65) = 4 + \frac{1}{48}$$
